James **Dunlap**

For those of you who do not know who I am, my name is James Dunlap. I am a Cooper-Billy Descendant of the House of Tse-Kwel from the Village of Weitchpec. My Grandparents were Henry Cooper and Elizabeth Logan, (sister of John Logan of Hoopa). I was raised in the SF Bay Area and attended school at San Jose State University.

I have operated a successful business for the last 13 years, as a Licensed Contractor. My clients have included Gottschalks Department Stores, Hilton, Marriotts, Holiday Inn, Comfort Inn and Best Western Hotels. I am TERO Certified with the Yurok, Shoshone-Bannock and the Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Reservations. I have contracted with the Yurok Indian Housing Authority since 2008. I was President of the All Indian Boarding Schools Association from 2001 until 2006. I am Chairman of the Board of Directors for Drug & Alcohol Detox & Treatment Services. I have developed programs for high-risk kids with the Sacramento Sheriffs Department, San Juan School District, and Kaiser Hospital Chemical Dependency Treatment Program. I carry in my pocket a Chip celebrating 23 years of Sobriety.

For the last 20 years I have returned to the river to fish and the mountains to hunt. I began to retrace who my family is, to visit, laugh and learn from my Elders. I talked with other Tribal members, to learn the who's who and the what's what of life on the Rez. I began to notice the inadequacies of services, the hostile work environment for Tribal employees and the tragic waste and abuse of Tribal Resources.

In 2008, I founded YurokVoices.com, to report information to Tribal members that live away from the Rez. As a result, Tribal members are able to find information and activities concerning Tribal events they otherwise would not hear about.

In 2010, I organized the first Inter-Tribal Elders Program, Salmon for Buffalo Trade. As part of the Wild Rivers Fish Kamp, we donate and deliver fish to the Elders, as well as anyone who doesn't have a fisher in the family. For the last 2 ½ years, I have lived in Klamath and have been welcomed by the Families of Requa. I am offering a new perspective to our problems and hardships. I am proposing new ideas for short term and long-term sustainability of our resources. And most importantly,

I will be the Single Point of Accountability.

My goal of Accountability and Transparency will begin with the Documentation of ALL Council meetings, via the use of Digital Video and Auditory Recordings. Thus providing the Tribe with a verifiable record for Legal Protection and Future Reference. Closed Meetings will still remain Restricted.

During Open Council Meetings, a Live Streaming Interactive Feed from Klamath, to the Weitchpec and Eureka Tribal Offices will enable Tribal members to attend and participate without having to spend money on the 1 to 2 hour road trip to Klamath.

A Mandated Minimum Response/

Acknowledgement Time, in which All Tribal Departments will respond to Tribal Member inquiries in a timely manner: 5 Days for a Letter, 3 days for an E-mail and 24 hours for a phone call. Creating Transparency in Our Tribal Government will hold Council Members and Department Heads Accountable for their behavior to the Tribal Members they are Employed by. Transparency is the Essence Of Good Government. In Limiting and Providing for a More Balanced Tribal Council, the Installment of an Oversight Committee to Review ALL Expense Items exceeding \$100,000 dollars to determine whether or not a Tribal Member Vote of Approval is needed, as required by our Tribal Constitution.

Short Term Economical Development will begin with:

1. The Creation of a Separate and Independent Economic Development/ Business Council.

2. A Sustainable Timber Harvest, Lumber Mill and Bio-Waste Plant. The lumber, Mandated for Purchase for ALL construction projects under authority of the Tribe.

3. Research, Development, Production and Marketing of a Reliable and Sustainable sources of Electrical Power.

The Long Term Goals:

Re-Acquisition of Hunting and Gathering Rights on Ancestral Lands

Initiating the Process to Secure Ocean Fishing Rights
Secure Inter-Government Relationships with Humboldt & Del Norte Counties

Address Long Term Recovery of Drug & Alcohol Dysfunctional Families

Create High-Tech and Highly Skilled Training Programs for Tribal Members

This is my life so far:

- Born and raised in Humboldt County from birth until 22 years old.
- Moved to Chico and earned Bachelor of Science degree in Engineering, 1986.
- Worked in San Diego for work in automotive engineering. Moved back east to work in construction as an engineering assistant.
- Returned to Humboldt County in 1989, to help my father expand his gravel hauling company: built the business from 1 truck into 5.
- Began work for Yurok Indian Housing Authority in December 2009.
- Now live in Requa.

This is my family:

- My great grandmother was Alice Frank Spott, who was the niece and adopted daughter of Captain Spott.
- My grandfather was Otto Hodge. My grandmother was Alice (Spott Hodge) Lewis. When my grandfather died, she married Mr. Ernie Lewis. She lived at Weitchpec.
- My father is Otto Hodge, Sr. My mother was Karen Lavonne Eldred, Swedish/Norwegian, who died in 2002.
- My three sisters, Lori, Kipp and Angela, all still live on the north coast.

- My 22 year old daughter, Jessi, is attending nursing school in Reno.

The tribal council chairman can do much to guide the Tribe to prosperity and job security, while remaining true to our Yurok traditions. These, in brief, are just a few things I will do to help the Tribe grow:

Rebuild our Yurok community. We need to think of ourselves as one people again. For instance, bring together groups of people to gather whatever is in season for the elders. Sponsor community celebration days throughout the year. Have all signs on the reservation written in Yurok/English.

Emphasize education. Pay far more attention to our youth. Build a rec center, a local middle school and a full time local high school. Hire good counselors and teachers to help parents raise good Yuroks. Find funds to help those who want to go on to college.

Take better care of our elders and our health care in general. Expand the health clinic – provide more dental facilities, more doctors, a physical therapy room, a rec room, day care center, afterschool programs in the rec room that would include elders. Find a way to build a rehab facility closer to home.

Give more support to economic development efforts. Build a destination lodge & develop ecotourism businesses. Develop a biomass industry that is ecologically clean and helps keep the underbrush clean, per Yurok tradition. A biomass facility would provide jobs cutting brush and running the facility,

as well as provide electricity to the reservation.

Develop hydropower capability. Use creeks in the winter when they're running strong. All homes on the reservation should run on solar, wind or hydropower, or all three. This would create electricity for citizens, provide surplus electricity for tribal use or sale, and provide jobs in installation and maintenance. It might even be possible to stockpile surplus funds to off-river people for electricity.

Develop the tribe's yellow rigid-hulled inflatable oceangoing boat for estuary tours.

Our staff is already doing a great job in developing the fish plant. Assist staff through tribal council support (more staff and funding) in further developing the plant so it can process fish parts into fertilizer for sale in high end (organic) gardening. Enlarge the fish plant so the tribe is able to become its own fish buyer, and cut out the middle man, resulting in higher prices to tribal citizens during the commercial season. Expand the plant to process more products than just fish.

Fiscal should authorize rechargeable credit cards, rather than wasting money and time on issuing food coupons and checks. Audits of the fiscal department must be random, and done by a company unknown to the Fiscal Department.

Assist our fine tribal staff in boosting administrative efficiency, so there is no duplication of effort and energy.

The Yurok Tribal Chairperson should be a source of pride and leadership to the Yurok people. As your Chairperson, I will help the tribe move forward into the 21st Century in a good Yurok way. ✨



Gary **Markussen Sr.**

As one of the Yurok People, I would greatly appreciate your Vote on October 10, 2012 for Chairperson of the Yurok tribe.

The first question to you as a voter ~ Are We As A Tribe Taking Care Of Our Yurok Tribal People At Home and In Their Communities? I must say NO! Not to the extent of were our Tribe should be since becoming a Federally Recognized Tribe in the last 24 years.

We do a great Program for Roads, Social Services, Fish, and Our River with limited resources. These are very important Programs and Tribal Causes as a Tribal Government. But why are Yuroks still suffering due to no jobs, no money to pay for electricity, food, water, and shelter? My Election Motto is "Take Care of Our Tribal Membership First".

So, when are we going to start Economical Development, and Fund our Tribal Programs, and Community Services for all of our People? ~ Our Elders, Our Poor, Our Handicapped, and Our working People, Our Children, Our College Students? We are forgetting the most Important Part of Our Tribal Constitution that says "Taking care

of our Yurok Tribal People “. This means no more Federally Funded Programs that go away in a 2-5 year lifespan. We as a Tribe need more Long Term Solutions that are funded by Tribal Economical Development to help the Yurok Membership across the board.

I asked this question at this years 2012 Annual Meeting of the Yurok Tribe “Where is the O.E.D.P. Document that was developed in 2000”?. “The O.E.D.P. {Overall Economical Development Plan }developed for the Tribe for a 5-10-15-20 years Overall Economical Development Plan”. This was done in Tribal Districts by the Tribal Council in 2000. The answer I received “ We never seen that “OEDP Plan” by Tribal Chair. So, is this the reason that we jump around to whatever is popular every three or four years as Our Council changes?

This is why I believe we are so far behind other Small Tribes. And look at the Yurok Tribe Staff turn-over rate. So many Tribal Administrators and Program Directors have left or been let go of, and losing staff is what puts us going backwards and affecting Department Services. So, when a new staff person comes on-board in this puts that person on a learning curve of starting over in Our Tribal Programs unless this person comes with great experience to our Tribe.

Now our NEW Tribal Issues concerning me:

1. Tribal Members getting into trouble with the Law and Stealing from Our Tribe~
2. Drugs and Alcohol problems by Tribal Staff on the job~
3. Staff turn-over in all Our Yurok Departments~
4. Taxes and Fees by Tribal Departments (Commercial Fish Tax, Ice Tax, Water Tax,) we go to far by taxing “Our Own Membership”, perhaps we should be Taxing people that come to Our Reservation that use Our Resources on Our River~
5. No Real Economical Development in all of our Districts, to Create New Tribal Business and Jobs~
6. No Long Term Funds for Emergency Services for Electricity, Medical Prescriptions, Elder care, Food, Water other than Short Term Small Program Dollars by the Tribe~
7. So much traveling by Tribal Council and Staff~

There is an old saying ” Not on my watch” well, enough is enough is my feelings along with many other Tribal Members who have shared these same feelings with me.

Those are the reasons why I humble myself to ask for your Vote as your Chairperson.

I was raised by A-walk Francis James and Patricia Hunsucker in the village of Wautek. I've been an advocate for membership for many years. I served as a committee member for Education, Social Services and Natural Resource. I've sat in hundreds of council meetings, fish meetings, Cultural Committee and YEDC meetings as well as an advocate for membership in tribal courts where I've done quite well. I'm a canoe builder Regalia builder most everything Yurok and willing to share this anyone willing to learn. Sometimes working for the tribe by mostly a volunteer. I'm now working on my second and third canoe for the Yurok tribe as a volunteer a project which I hoped would involved tribal youth creating canoe builders for the future. Misfortunetly this hasn't happened due to lack of participation from the Yurok tribe. Over the years I've developed many friendships within the faculty of the office giving me a great incite into the working of tribal government. Some even tease that I'm the policy and procedure officer. It's the responsibility of the chair to see to it that policy and procedure and the constitution are followed guide lines set forth to assure fairness, yet the misuse of tribal vehicles by council as well as the chair himself Seems to happen. Apparently there are no policies against carrying a firearm in tribal vehicles, but there should be. Common sense should tell you thats wrong

drive your own vehicle if you wish to carry a gun. The chair has many responsibilities to membership and the constitution as well there for should not approve action items to go forward that violate either. A hundred year lease on trees for carbon points committing tribal members for generations without memberships approval Generating funds that are quickly spent. The constitution states clearly that no Yurok land will be leased for more than 20 years without memberships approval. But if the trees are tied to the land than the land too its committed in my opinion a violation of the constitution the closure of subsistence fishing in the Mid-Klam is a violation of traditional law which is protected by the constitution. Yes I understand conservation and Im an advocate for healthy river but in a year of hundred thousand fish returning how crazy is that

We've all read the stories in the tribal newspaper of our newly land purchase and how it would pay for itself in carbon points turns out it won't. We made our first payment of 750 thousand from the million set aside leaving 250 thousand of 750 due next year if the carbon points are not there Do you think a casino in Klamath will make the payments on the land and the 10 million plus we will have to borrow to build it sure it will Sure it will create a few jobs But its not the financial miracle we need and here we are the biggest fish return in 20 years and the fish plant is not up and running the future of economic development is key to our survival since we are a grant driven tribe we need a qualified ED director capable of bringing us into the future quickly

So that all can benefit as tribal members grant funds must meet pacific criterias usually not meeting the needs of membership of the rez. EDD dollars may be the only way to meet these needs. There for we must move forward to meet these needs as quickly as possible the enviornment should be a concern of all of us yet we fail to stop spraying of the water shed by the timber company that operates within the rez Boundaries further polluting the river. Its my opinion that council should work within the guidelines determined by the people in a world of cell phones computers and entertainment how hard can it be to solicit membership for their opinion. Its time for constitution committee of tribal members to intercept the constitution Im asking for your vote Dave Severns ✨

I am from the village of Rek-woi and am proud to be the granddaughter of Geneva and Emery Mattz. I have fought my whole life for Yurok rights and tribal sovereignty and am humbled to ask you for your vote for the position of Yurok Vice-Chair.

The Constitution states that all major decisions will be brought to the Tribal Membership for a vote. I believe the 26 million plus Trust Settlement dollars the Tribe will be getting in the near future is significant and needs to be brought to the people for your vote. You have a right to determine how this money gets paid out.

Many of us are without jobs and struggle for even the basic necessities. It's hard to think about big social programs or water fights when we struggle to pay the light bill, put food on the table or find money for gas. It's clear our people need jobs with decent wages that can support a family. But, the Tribe can't create jobs, or educate our children, or even fight for our fishing and water rights if we don't have a plan. Again, it's simple: without a plan, we'll keep spinning our wheels, wasting our resources, time, money and the jobs that Tribal Members deserve won't happen.

As Vice-Chair I will work with you to create a Tribal Plan that focuses on jobs, natural resources, education, and economic development, social and cultural development. I will make sure that this plan is from the people for the people by holding community meetings and workshops where you can come and freely share your real thoughts and opinions about where the Tribe should be today and in the future. With this plan we will be able to hold the Tribal government accountable. Without it, we won't be able to create the kind of jobs and future that

will put food on our table and allow us to keep and defend our sovereignty.

I have had the honor to serve and work with the Yurok People since 1978 from fishing wars to organizing the Tribe. I have also represented Indian Country and the Yurok People nationally through my role as President of the National Congress of the American Indian and I still continue to work for Indian sovereignty through roles nationally as Chairperson of the Indian Law Resource Center and National Center for American Indian Enterprise Development, Vice Chair. I got involved, because I wanted the Yurok Tribes interests to be represented and heard at all levels of government. The Yurok people have always come first for me and I guarantee that my work in Indian Country for over 30 years has been solely dedicated to advancing the Yurok people and when elected I will not only bring those national resources and networks to the table - I will be working hard on a daily basis for you. Further, I will not draw a salary but will rather set those funds aside for development projects for the Yurok people. I will be committed to Yurok issues, listen to your concerns and use the national networks and relationships I have fostered over three decades to help Yurok people.

As the Vice-Chair, it will also be important to make sure that the Tribal Council is accountable to the people and will make decisions that are open and transparent. I will work and commit to ensuring that Council only goes into Executive Session for legitimate reasons identified in our Constitution and not because they don't want to have tough conversations and discussions out in public. Council is elected for the people and the people have the right to know what is happening in their government and their nation and to be treated with respect and dignity.

Lastly, I am concerned that Tribal Elders often cannot make ends meet. We all know that income limits mean many Elders can't get enough Tribal assistance to help out with daily needs and medical expenses. Tribal Elders have worked hard to ensure that we still have our sovereignty. I will work hard to ensure that all Tribal Elders - no matter the income - receive a monthly allowance or assistance payment to appropriately honor them and to help with their day to day needs.

The Yurok People deserve a Vice-Chair who has worked hard for decades to do what is right for the Yurok People and will continue to fight. I humbly ask for your Vote.
